Answers will vary. Here are some sample answers.

- 1. Today people have many appliances such as microwaves, dishwashers, lawnmowers, and many other household conveniences that save us time and energy so we can do other things like watch television, which is also an invention of the last 100 years. Also, factories and industrial machines now create products easily and more cheaply. However, the biggest invention is more recent. It is the computer and its relationship to the Internet. DISCUSS THE PLAY

- 1. At the end of the play, Aida finally accepts that she might have talent when she gets an offer from a theatre professional. She also realizes that she has a lot of experience participating in theatre, but she does not have the same experience in science.
- 2. Aida's parents enjoy watching Aida as an actress, and they are enthusiastic about a future when they can continue to watch her perform. From their perspective, a future in theatre is glamorous.
- 3. Lily is more practical. She understands that it is difficult for actors to have a comfortable life because they rarely get a full-time job. She values getting a job with a regular income. Ken just thinks being an actress would be fun.

- 4. Aida has a casual relationship with her parents. They do not seem very strict, and they do not force her do things. She is also not afraid to argue with them. At the same time, they put pressure on her by constantly talking about their wishes for her.
- 5. For many people it depends. Aida decides to continue something that she has spent a lot of time on already. It makes sense that she continues acting after getting accepted at a famous performing arts school. However, for other people, however, becoming an actor or actress is not a good choice because it is hard to be successful.

- 2. The social issue is how young people decide on a career. Should children decide on their own careers, or should parents make a decision? Another issue is to think about what jobs will be available in the future.
- 3. It's funny because the father wants his daughter to be an actress. Usually parents want their children to go into STEM fields, but in this play the parents and child are opposites. When they argue, it's kind of funny.
- 4. Parents who want to convince their children to do something might empathize. Kids who are trying to decide on a career might empathize.
